The **Educational Opportunity Fund** is the area of the new AAUW Funds that is most closely aligned with the former “AAUW Educational Foundation”. It houses the endowment funds that honor AAUW leaders, specific branches, and other priorities of the members. The national organization allocates some undesignated EOF funds to the endowments that are closest to reaching stipend producing level.

The one such endowment associated with North Carolina is the **Ann Chipley American Fellowship**, started by the national board, not AAUW NC, in honor of a member of the national staff who had been deeply involved in AAUW as a volunteer in North Carolina. As of 12/31/2015, the fund had \$90,902.66 and needs to reach \$100,000 by June 30, 2017 for fellowships to be awarded in Ann Chipley’s honor.
