Award Winner Attends Convention

Award-winning author and illustrator Clay Carmichael will receive the AAUW Award for Juvenile Literature at the Charlotte convention on Saturday afternoon, April 17. *Wild Things* shares the story of 11 year old Zoe, who is adopted by her sculptor uncle after her mother commits suicide. His zany artistic creations, a lively feral cat and other creatures, make for a fresh and rewarding tale which was also selected as a Kirkus Reviews Best Children's Book of 2009. Carmichael lives and works in Carrboro, NC with her husband, sculptor Mike Roig. She teaches writing and illustrating, in addition to giving presentations about her publishing process. As a Writer-in-Residence at schools, she teaches poetry, illustration and bookmaking. Her picture books are available in many languages. Carmichael will sign her books following the presentation on Saturday. The NC Office of Archives and History of the NC Dept. of Cultural Resources administers the book award program, including AAUW's recognition of outstanding juvenile literature authors.

Charlotte Convention Highlights

Lill Van Order and I welcome you all to convention in Charlotte on April 16-17, 2010! We have planned convention activities with a variety of topics to appeal to all branch members.

Make a point to attend the Board meeting late Friday afternoon. Full participation by all branches is important, especially before we begin another year of planning and programming for our state organization in 2010-2011.

On Friday evening (following dinner on your own with friends), we will show the film highlighting the efforts of Congresswoman Patsy T. Mink (1927-2002), principal author of Title IX. Mink drafted the legislation as an outgrowth of adversities she faced in obtaining her undergraduate degrees at the University of Hawaii and University of Nebraska.

Attendees will have a choice of attending two of three workshops on Saturday morning:

- Beth Jacobs from the NC Justice Center will discuss a decade of efforts in NC to narrow the racial achievement gap in education.
- Beth Dehghan, NC Coordinator of efforts to ratify the international bill of rights for women, will provide an up-to-date report on these activities, as well

as discuss the global welfare and well-being of women over the last fifteen years.

- Mel Miller, professional financial advisor, will discuss the values of networking in the context of professional and social benefits.

Following a lunch buffet, Carol Rognrud, AAUW national Senior Development Officer, will speak and entertain questions as our Leader On Loan to this convention. We expect that discussion at the business meeting at 2:00 p.m. will focus in part on proposed bylaws changes to address the voting process for AAUW NC members attending convention or special meetings of the state.

Later on Saturday afternoon, author and illustrator Clay Carmichael will receive the AAUW Juvenile Literature Award and comment on *Wild Things*, her award-winning book. Carmichael will also be available for book signing.

Our annual Memorial Service will conclude Saturday's activities before the evening banquet begins, which will feature a cash bar, a "Toast to the Branches" and installation of new state officers.

The Gastonia and Salisbury branches are working with convention coordinator Diane Schneider and other members of the Charlotte branch to make the hospitality suite arrangements for Friday and Saturday.

The North Carolina Council for Women/ Domestic Violence Commission

AAUW member Mary A. Peterson has been named to chair the North Carolina Council for Women/Domestic Violence Commission for 2010. The Council/Commission also has a new executive director, Jill Dinwiddie. The NC Council for Women and the Domestic Violence Commission involve the work of two separate statewide boards working to improve the lives of women in NC.

Mission Statement:

The mission of the N.C. Council for Women/Domestic Violence Commission is to advise the governor, North Carolina legislature and the state departments on the special needs of women in North Carolina by:

- Identifying and assessing needs.
- Collecting and distributing information about the status of women.
- Acting as a resource for local Councils/Commis-

sions for women.

- Collaborating with other groups and individuals working on behalf of women.
- Identifying and assessing statewide needs, including domestic violence.
- Assuring that necessary services, policies and programs are provided to those in need and strengthening existing programs.

Mary reminds us of an important point of view: *"Service is the rent we pay for space on this earth,"* quoted from former US Representative Shirley Chisholm.

And After Convention?

The easiest aspect of planning for the April 2010 state convention in Charlotte is knowing that there is a beginning and an end.

Registration opens on Friday at 2pm and convention ends after the Saturday banquet. As Program Co-VPs, our task is to fit various activities into this time frame.

There is a much greater challenge confronting not only AAUW officers but all branch members once convention is over. We all must answer the question, "What should we do with our state organization?"

This question will take a great deal of time to discuss, debate and resolve.

The prime reasons for beginning to rethink AAUW NC's leadership structure are the branches' changing needs. How many of our branches resemble those that were active in their communities five years ago? 10 or 15 years ago?

Over 20 years ago (in 1987) at AAUW's Biennial Convention, delegates passed a resolution to encourage states (and branches) to explore organizational structures to make the most effective use of members' time, talents, energies and resources. Shortly after that convention, an article in *Leader in Action* offered the following guidelines for beginning an exercise to develop an effective branch or state structure:

- Focus on function rather than structure. FORM WILL FOLLOW FUNCTION when the goals of the organization, rather than the officer and committee positions,

are charted.

- Ask "What can we do for our branches?" rather than "What can our branches do for AAUW?"
- Focus on job content rather than job titles or job descriptions.
- Consider shared or rotating leadership models, as well as consensus decision-making.
- Be open to organizing by geographic location or by interests or by skills.
- Don't worry about the bylaws.

While we will just touch briefly on some of these issues in Charlotte (perhaps at Board or business meetings), the question, "What should we do with our state organization?" begs for unhurried answers.

As Program CoVPs for one more year, we would be willing to plan some kind of "constitutional convention" in 2011. We envision a session over sandwiches, a glass of wine and perhaps even roasted marshmallows, where branches begin this discussion. "Don't do too much too fast" would be the first premise of this. Trust, a willingness to take risks and a respect for the similarities and differences in opinion that each branch would bring to the discussion are the only other prerequisites for participating.
