It houses the endowment funds that honor AAUW leaders, specific branches, and other priorities of the members. This year, the national organization allocated undesignated EOF funds to the endowments that were closest to reaching stipend producing level. The one such endowment associated with North Carolina is the **Ann Chipley American Fellowship**, started by the national board, not AAUW NC, in honor of a member of the national staff who had been deeply involved as a volunteer in North Carolina.
