
Ellyn Bache - author of **The Art of Saying Goodbye** and seven other novels including **Safe Passage** which became a Susan Sarandon film. Her latest novel is an inspiring reminder to live life to its fullest. It's the story of four friends who grapple with their dear friend's fatal illness. A deeply felt and beautiful story. A native of Washington D.C., Ellyn lived in Wilmington for over 20 years and now divides her time between the Carolinas and Pennsylvania.



James Kaufman – author of **The Collectibles** is an attorney, businessman and former judge. He drew heavily on his experience in law, the business world, and interactions with people of a widely different background to create his first novel. This is a gripping story of two men from two separate worlds. One man is touched by tragedy, the other by greed. They are brought together with unexpected results. Kaufman is currently writing a screen play for this book and working on a second novel.



Dana Sachs - author of **The Life We Were Given** examines the long lasting effects of the rescue called Operation Baby Lift in Viet Nam. Sachs presents and examines many perspectives on international adoptions. She follows one child, Anh, through her adoption and then decades later her return to meet her birth mother. Dana lived in Hanoi in the early 90's. This is her second book to delve into the Viet Nam era and experience.



Bertha Todd - author of **My Restless Journey**, a memoir of her life as a strong voice for the African Community in Wilmington. Todd was a former school teacher, librarian, and principal as well as an active member in political circles and a community historian. She served on the 1898 Centennial Commission, and the New Hanover County Human Relation Commission. She takes us from her early childhood through the ups and downs of an active and invigorating life.

AMERICAN WOMEN WHO SHAPED WORLD HISTORY by Enid Bellows

Catherine Beecher (1800-1878)

Catherine Beecher was a pioneer in mathematics education and education for women. Ideas that are considered “modern” today actually originated with her. She was born in New York in 1800, one of 13 children of an outspoken religious leader and a mother who loved to solve mathematical problems. Her famous siblings include Harriet Beecher Stowe and abolitionist Henry Ward Beecher.



Although she was born to a wealthy and prominent family, she was educated at home until she was 10 years old. At that time she went to a private school where she was taught the young women’s limited curriculum. She was almost entirely self-taught and included subjects not available to her, including mathematics, Latin, and philosophy. Since there was no university education for women, Beecher at 20 undertook a two-year independent study course to prepare for teaching. In 1821 Catherine became a teacher at a school in New Haven, Connecticut. Later she opened the Hartford Seminary for Girls in Hartford, Connecticut, where her sister Harriet was first a pupil and then a

teacher.

In 1823 her fiancée was lost at sea.

In 1832 Beecher opened the Western Female Institute in Cincinnati to train teachers for the vast territory of the West. Through this school and other organizations, she set up training for 30,000 teachers. She also expanded the school curriculum to include physical education classes. She was one of the first to teach home economics as a school subject. She wrote several books on domestic science, explaining how to systematize homemaking skills. In 1832 she became one of the first American women to write a mathematics textbook, *Arithmetic Simplified*. Her work also led her to establish the “American Women’s Educational Association.”

Some of Catherine Beecher’s innovative ideas included: 1) dividing students below college level into smaller classes that were approximately equal in ability; 2) using the most gifted students to assist her in class; 3) limiting mathematics class size to 6 to 10 students, the maximum a teacher could teach effectively; 4) having teachers teach only 2 or 3 subjects instead of all subjects; 5) encouraging teachers to use visual aids in mathematics instruction; 6) using blackboards to work problems instead of having students memorize everything, which was the custom then; and 7) expecting students to fully understand what they were doing and to be able to communicate their reasoning in mathematical language rather than merely calculating the answers by rote.



Catherine Beecher died in 1878 from apoplexy.
