

News from the State Board Meeting

July 17/18 were two busy days in Hendersonville as state officers, branch presidents and members gathered to disseminate information from our Association Convention, which took place this June in St. Louis. Some of the items discussed were:

- o The <u>One Member, One Vote</u> proposal, which passed. This means we no longer elect delegates to represent us at conventions as each branch member has a vote.
- o The Open Membership proposal which was voted down. Our membership eligibility requirements remain the same as last year.
- AAUW NC agreed to partner with the League of Women Voters to support passage of the <u>Equal Rights Amendment</u>.
- The <u>Member Showcase</u> which is available on the AAUW website to help publicize branch events.
- The restructuring of the Association allowing for \$46.00 of our membership dues to be tax deductible (As previously reported by Ann Sherman Skiba).
- The emphasis on <u>Public Policy</u> action and a de-emphasis on the age of members. (The point being that members of all ages can be active and productive.)
- o Plans for our next State Convention, which will be in Charlotte next April.





Did You Know?

Carolyn H. Garfein, of Alpharetta, Georgia, was recently elected to a two-year term as president of the AAUW Board of Directors. The election was held at the 2009 AAUW National Convention in St. Louis, Missouri, which was attended by more than 1,000 members representing more than 1,300 AAUW states and branches.

In addition to the election of Garfein and other new AAUW board members, the national convention featured presentations by a number of high-profile political activists and elected officials who have championed the issues of importance to women and their families, including Rep. Rosa DeLauro (D-CT), Rep. Jackie Speier (D-CA), and the face of pay equity, Lilly Ledbetter.

Ledbetter is the inspiration behind the first piece of legislation signed by President Barack Obama, which restores basic protections that allow workers to challenge wage discrimination. "The recent passage of the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act is one small victory in the battle for pay equity for women. We won't stop fighting until women — and men — receive equal pay for equal work," said Garfein.

FINANCIAL ISSUES FOR WOMEN - WHAT ARE YOUR CONCERNS?

UNDERSTANDING CREDIT RATINGS OF INDIVIDUAL BONDS

I hope your summer was a rewarding and restful one. In light of our concern over the present economy and the possible need for a higher percentage of our portfolio represented in fixed income, I felt the following information may be valuable.

- Bonds are only one way to own fixed income, but the most common for many investors.
- Credit ratings for the bonds are preformed by rating agencies such as; Moody's, Standard and Poor's (S&P), and Fitch (Fitch IBCA).
- Credit ratings indicate, on a scale of high to low, the probability of default (the inability to repay debt on time in full). Failure to redeem principal at maturity and inability to pay interest payments on time to bondholders would constitute default.
- Bonds issued directly by the U.S. government are considered to be free of default, therefore, are not rated. They are considered to be the safest and highest quality. Treasury Securities (www.treasurydirect.com) and savings bonds are in the category.
- The more money available to cover the debt, the higher the rating, Changes in rating can occur as the economic fortunes of the insurer varies. Major or minor changes can occur in the ratings. The corporate bond sector ratings can change overnight if a company buys another company and increases its debt.
- The interest cost to the issuer is the coupon you will earn. Bonds of high quality usually will be pay less than lower credit ratings due to the increase of risk. The higher the yields, the higher the risk.
- If your bond is "downgraded", the bond price may decline and visa versa. Unless there is a genuine risk of default (the inability to pay the interest), the price changes as a result of downgrades or upgrades are far less major than those occurring due to changes in interest rate levels. Downgrades in higher risk bonds can be more serious as would "investment grade" bonds going below investment grade ratings.
- Your principal is only guaranteed at maturity.
 The interest rate remains the same until the bond is sold or matures. However, the price

- or value of the bond can fluctuate based on changes in the interest rates. If the interest rates increase and new bonds can be bought to pay more interest, the value of your bond will go down if you sold at that time. If the interest rates were lower at the time of sale (not maturity), your bond may be valued higher and can be sold at a profit.
- Defaults of bonds rated "investment grade" or higher are rare. However, default of more risky bonds or "junk bonds" (bonds rated below "investment grade") are higher. Defaulted bonds usually have some salvage value and you seldom lose 100% of the principal value of the bond. Many defaults have been taken in the form of a suspension of coupon payments. If coupon payments are resumed, the price of the bonds could soar. There are no guarantees that this would happen. Debt from low quality corporate bonds and emerging market debt can be highly speculative. If you are risk adverse, you may not want to participate in this situation.
- Diversification is the key. Don't put all your assets in one basket. Buy bonds from different insurers and different maturities to diversify credit and interest rate risk.
- Sometimes bonds are bought with a "call feature". This means the insurer is permitted or required to redeem the bond before the stated maturity date usually at or above par (face value).

Keep an eye on the ratings and source of revenue that will be used to pay the debt of the bond insurer. Your broker can keep you abreast of changes in ratings and the call feature of your bond. It is your responsibility to understand the kind of bonds you purchase. Not all bonds are

the same. The table below will give you an idea of the ratings given by the three rating companies listed above.

Note: Some agencies add a "1" to indicate a slightly higher credit quality.; for instance, a rating of A1 is a higher quality credit rating than an A rating.
