






School Funding Overview






Most funding for NC's public schools comes from the legislature (state dollars).

Rankings: Funding for *Public* Schools



NC is 49th in the nation for "funding effort".

"Funding Effort measures the amount of state and local tax revenue dedicated to <u>K-12 public education</u> relative to the state's overall economic output, or <u>Gross Domestic Product</u> (GDP). This metric indicates a state's commitment to funding education; for example, a higher percentage of GDP spent on schools signifies a greater effort to support their students."







Test scores, graduation rates on the rise for North Carolina students

North Carolina students achieved a three-year high in most standardized tests at the end of the 2024-25 academic year, according to the annually released test data that was presented to the State Board of Education today.



The percentage of students proficient in reading and math reached their highest level in three years in 12 of 15 tests.


Only *Grade 3* reading, English II and NC Math 1 did not achieve their highest level.

The combined results for all grades and subjects (composite score) for all race/ethnicity groups also reached their highest level in three years.

The ACT composite score for 11th graders was up slightly from last year at 18.2 and moving toward the state goal of 20 by 2030.






More work is needed! = Accountability

- Scores in most grades/subjects still fall short of pre-pandemic levels. Statewide, only grade 4 reading and math have exceeded pre-pandemic levels, though many others are close.
- Hurricane Helene added additional challenges for western counties that lost multiple weeks of school due to the devastation caused by Helene.

NC's voucher program is the most unregulated in the U.S.

- 1 Any student with a voucher must be educated in reading, grammar, math, social studies, and science.
- 2 If 60% of students are publicly funded, school must participate in the state testing program.
- 3 For all high schools and for any school in which 65% of students are getting vouchers.

NC Voucher Schools: NO Accountability!





NC private schools that receive state-funded tuition payments are required to administer tests to students in grades 3 and above. However, each school is allowed to select its preferred test and the results are not made public.



Voucher Expansion: Policy



Prior Enrollment in a Public School

2014-2022 required for grades 2-12

2022-2024 required for grades 3-12

2024-2025 no longer required!

Why this matters:


When the program started, this requirement prevented most students already enrolled in private school from accessing a voucher.

Voucher Expansion: Policy

Eligibility expanded since voucher introduction in 2014-15 Starting with the 2024-25 school year, ALL families are now eligible for vouchers


Total dollars spent on private school tuition vouchers 2014-15 through 2024-25, by county

Dollar amounts represent funds sent to private schools within each county. Grey counties have zero voucher-accepting private schools.


Voucher funds per county

Private School Vouchers



Lost lawsuit was devastating!

- In Dec. 2013 a lawsuit filed against the voucher program.
- In 2014 a Superior Court Judge found the vouchers unconstitutional.

The NCGA appealed, and in July 2015 the NC Supreme Court overruled the Superior Court. They ruled vouchers do not violate the NC Constitution. This ruling led us to where we are today: diverting hundreds of millions of taxpayer dollars per year to private school vouchers.

NEW Federal Vouchers



New, Federal Voucher Program:

Established under the July 5, 2025 budget bill H.R. 1 ("Big Beautiful Bill"), the federal school voucher program is the first of its kind. Participation requires state approval. The NCGA moved swiftly to pass an opt-in bill: HB 87. However, Governor Stein vetoed the legislation citing the lack of federal guidance.
